

ELCOME TO YOUR AUGUST 2018 NEWSLETTER. I WOULD LIKE TO START MY ARTICLE THIS MONTH REPORTING ON OUR JULY GENERAL MEETING AT EMU PLAINS. THE MEETING WAS OUR THIRD YEAR AT EMU PLAINS. AN OPPORTUNITY FOR OUR MEMBERS IN SYDNEY'S OUTER WEST AND BLUE MOUNTAINS TO ATTEND A GENERAL MEETING.

At this year's meeting at Emu Plains, we were fortunate to have Senator Doug Cameron address our meeting. Senator Doug Cameron (*please call me Doug*) is a senator whom working people can relate. He emigrated to Australia at the age of 22 in 1973. He worked first at Garden Island and then at the Liddell Power Station.

When John Lane introduced Doug to the meeting, he joked the senator that he must have done excellent job while there, for the federal government to continue to call for the Liddell Power Station to remain open. Doug responded that when he worked there in 1970s, the power station had never run at full capacity and needed constant maintenance.

After Liddell, Doug first became a Union organiser for the Hunter Valley and New England regions. He then went onto become the Assistant State Secretary of the Australian Manufacturing Workers Union, then National Assistant Secretary and National Secretary before being elected to the Senate in 2007. He is the current shadow minister for two portfolios *Skills, TAFE and Apprenticeships* and *Housing and Homelessness*.

Doug was particularly passionate in his criticism of the Turnbull Government's cuts to TAFE. There have been cuts of more than \$3 billion dollars from TAFE, apprenticeships and vocational education (including \$270 million in this year's budget). He mentioned that since the current government came to power, Australia had lost 140, 000 apprenticeship places.

He advised that Labor if returned to power at the next election would guarantee TAFE funding, waive upfront fees for one hundred thousand TAFE students. Further, one in ten employees on government infrastructure projects would have to be an apprenticeship position. There would be a crack down on the abuse of 457 visas and Labor would ensure jobs are first advertised in Australia before an application for 457 visa could be made.

Senator Cameron mentioned that rules governing Unions under Fair Work Act have to change to allow Unions a fairer bargaining position. Otherwise, a country that once stood for the "fair-go" would continue to have increasing inequality.

Sadly, Doug will retire at the next election, we can only hope his replacement will be as forthright in their advocacy for working Australians. The meeting moved that the Retired Members present a Certificate of Gratitude to Senator Doug Cameron.

Les was a member of the *Retired Members Association* for over eighteen years. Les was a close friend of the late Jim Hall, President of our Union (formerly known as the ATEA).

The following are tributes to Les Brigden from Perc Mallard and Roger Bamber.

Leslie Henry Brigden AKA (Briggy) – commenced with the PMG in 1957 as a Technician in Training (TIT) and in his second year, Les was assigned to Penrith Telephone Exchange. I remember in my first year (1959) at Strathfield Training school and when the Instructors found out I lived at Penrith, they would ask me if I knew a Les Brigden – even as a first year TIT, Les had gained a reputation for being an outstanding technical person.

I first met Les in 1961, during my third year as a Technician in Training. I was also fortunate in getting a transfer to Penrith Exchange where confirmation of the instructors' opinion became obvious that Les (Briggy) had a special gift; while he was still in his fifth year of training, Les was a technical mainstay of the exchange. Penrith was then a multi-functional district with the traditional switching network, Long Line equipment as well as area PABX's etc. Sure, there were staff there who had been Technicians and Senior Technicians for some years, but when something technical really 'hit the fan' then 'Briggy' was the man they would call upon. During his working life Les became the Supervising Technician in charge of the switching network at Penrith Exchange; he had oversight of the transition from *Step x Step* to the *Crossbar* exchange technology together with the massive technical growth in the Penrith region during the 1980's. Les finished his technical career as the Officer in Charge of Glenbrook exchange.

Les was not a seeker of fame, nor was he the type of person to push himself forward. But these things happened anyway.

Rest in peace my friend.

When I was a young class 2 Engineer I had the pleasure of working with Les at Penrith after a newly installed crossbar extension in 1972/73. Several memories remain of Les' Technical excellence.

I remember first walking into the crossbar after a warm greeting from Jim Hall "he's our new shiny arse Engineer" to which I said to Jim "you can go and get..." or words to that effect. Les was listening intently to the crossbar and finally blocked out some faulty equipment. He could and regularly did detect faults just by listening to the sounds. A rare talent.

The new crossbar installation was cut over without any direct circuits to the metropolitan exchanges, as a consequence the place was in severe congestion. Les identified a couple of solutions which we put into place without any authorisation. As a result, Customers could call Liverpool without any delay and most other metropolitan exchanges were also accessible. This lasted for many months until the normal processes were able to deliver circuits to the metropolitan areas. At the same time Les covered for Jim Hall on the Area exchanges when Jim was frequently absent on Union Business without any extra remuneration or reward. I have fond memories of working very closely with Les solving issues so that Customers got the Service that they paid for in spite of the failings of the formal processes of the PMG. I also enjoyed many a Schooner at the Australian Arms with Les and Jim, usually after work.

Les was one of the best Technicians that I had the pleasure of working closely with over 41.5 years. Vale old Mate

Drought Relief

Remember, a few years ago, the federal government and the NSW State Government were warning of a looming debt crisis. The Federal government called it a budget emergency. There were calls to broaden the GST to include food and a plan introduce a State income tax.

Now, it seems the NSW and federal governments are awash with money. The Berejiklian government plans to start next year a rebuild two football stadiums. One the stadium at Homebush is just over twenty years old. As well, the State Government is to spend \$ 0.5 million dollars as prize money for a greyhound race. When I first heard of the \$2.5 billion dollars for stadium rebuilds, I thought this is great news, given the money the government is able to spend, there should be no more concern about school or hospital funding. Now, the reality is beginning to set-in for the NSW government. The drought is intensifying across the State. Farmers and people in regions need urgent relief. Farmer representative groups have described State government current financial offers of help as tokenism.

The Berejiklian government is now beginning to realise farmers will need further help. I hope farmers and regional areas affected by drought get a timely and the correct level of government assistance. The lesson for State and federal governments, bumper revenues do not last forever. They also need to think before they play politics around the issue of government debt.

National Anti-Corruption Commission

I have mentioned n the past, the need for a Federal ICAC. There has been renewed public calls for a federal anti-corruption agency. A Sydney Morning Herald article by no less a person than a former Liberal opposition leader Dr John Hewson has called upon Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull to introduce a national anti-corruption and integrity commission.

Dr Hewson highlighted a number of issues that are now in the headlines.

The award of \$444 million dollar grant to a little-known group, the Great Barrier Reef Foundation. This group can use 10 percent of this grant (\$40m) to seek donations from private backers to fund reef repair. All this was done without a public tender process.

Michaelia Cash's office tip-offs about AWU raids is now believed to be a crime. The Federal Police have referred the matter to the Director of Public Prosecutions for a legal opinion.

The prosecutions against a former Australian spy and his lawyer for going public that our country bugged the offices of East Timor government. The purpose was to gain an advantage during negotiations over gas resources bordering East Timor and Australia.

The government for not acting sooner on the shonky VET FEE-HELP scheme. Shonky colleges have costed taxpayers billions of dollars? While our TAFE colleges collapse.

Finally, Dr Hewson mentioned the frequent public vilification by senior public officials of charities, community groups and democratic institutions who hold the government to account.

Our next general meeting is on Thursday, 23rd August 2018. We are back at the FSU for the remainder of the year.

I would like to end by wishing Happy Birthday to Peter Lygoe who turns 80 years on the18th of this month.
